1. Student Success Plan

Literacy TERM 2:

- a. Primary to grade 3: 66% of students are meeting grade level benchmark.
 (Data is skewed because results submitted too early, results at this point in the school year, are actually higher)
 - Pr- Gr. 3: 65% of girls are meeting
 - Pr- Gr. 3: 67% of boys are meeting
 - Pr- Gr. 3: 75% of ANS students are meeting
 - Pr- Gr. 3: 100% of IND students are meeting
- b. Grade 4-6: 81% of students are meeting grade level benchmark.
 - Gr. 4-6: 70% of girls are meeting
 - Gr. 4-6: 82% of boys are meeting
 - Gr. 4-6: 25% of ANS students are meeting
 - Gr. 4-6: 33% of IND students are meeting

RRS Teachers work together in Professional Learning Community to identify each individual student who is not meeting and to make decisions for intervention. These statistics help identify trends and where the school resources are needed.

SAC discussed how we can support this work. We (SAC) could write a letter to HRCE to reconsider the current model or formula in how resources are allocated to schools based on data as we feel the current model is not adequately meeting school needs in regard to well-being and academic achievement.

Mathematics TERM 2:

a) Primary: Representing and Partitioning #s to 10:

100% of students are either meeting or exceeding grade level benchmarks

Gr. 1: Representing and Partitioning #s to 20:

74% of students are meeting or exceeding grade level benchmarks

74% of students are meeting or exceeding grade level benchmarks

45% of students are meeting or exceeding grade level benchmarks
